

Dr. Richard Van West-Charles' visit, a Consular Access Visit was also conducted to a Guyanese citizen detained at the Macagua prison in San Felix, Bolivar State, ensuring his health and physical integrity. Additionally, H.E. Dr. Richard Van West-Charles is actively working on addressing with two Guyanese citizens detained in Porlamar, Nueva Esparta State, Venezuela, as well as, in conjunction with the Red Cross, the Embassy is actively seeking the whereabouts of four Guyanese fishermen missing since November 2023.





Diplomatic Outreach

As part of H.E. Dr. Richard Van West-Charles' agenda in February, various courtesy visits were made to Ambassadors accredited to the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, including Qatar, South Korea, and Saudi Arabia. Additionally, Guyana remains open to dialogue, cooperation, and the strengthening of diplomatic relations, with a commitment to seeking peace as a guiding principle.

Visit to the facilities of "El Sistema" of Orchestras

As part of the Diplomatic Agenda, H.E. Dr. Richard Van West-Charles visited the facilities of the Youth Orchestra System known as "El Sistema". This project aims to teach music to Venezuelan children from every region starting at an early age, serving as a cultural development model. It is also a replicable project in Guyana, sparking Guyana's interest in fostering exchanges and projects with "El Sistema" in music education and training.



Remarks by Mohamed Irfaan Ali, Council President and President of the Co-operative Republic of Guyana, at the Security Council meeting on climate change and food insecurity



February 13, 2024

Council President and President of Guyana, speaking in his national capacity, stressed the significant impact of conflict, food security and climate change on global security. Highlighting the dire consequences of conflictdriven hunger, he pointed to the fact that nearly 149 million Africans are currently facing acute food insecurity, with 122 million of them residing in conflict-affected areas. Drawing attention to the significant economic toll of conflicts, he cited the \$5 billion needed to eradicate hunger caused by war in Africa and the \$4 billion worth of agricultural losses in Ukraine due to conflict-induced land degradation.

More than 6 million hectares of land in Colombia have been abandoned or seized as a result of conflict between 1980 and 2010. Disappointed over the lack of action by the international community, he said: "We do not see the interplay and we do not place priority on these issues".

Putting a spotlight on the overlooked consequences of war, he underscored the significant economic, social and environmental damages inflicted, including land degradation, deforestation and greenhouse gas emissions.



Remarks by Mohamed Irfaan Ali, Council President and President of the Co-operative Republic of Guyana, at the Security Council meeting on climate change and food insecurity

"The war in Iraq generated 141 million of emission in four years, which is equivalent of 20 million cars in one year," he observed, highlighting an estimated 150 million tons of carbon dioxide expected from the conflict in Ukraine after 18 months of war. With the environmental and food impacts during the rebuilding phase not being calculated, he asked whether "we are we going to be bold to calculate these damages and assign a value to the damage".

Noting that "food and climate are sometimes missing from the overall analysis of the impact of war and conflict", he urged the Security Council to adopt "a very targeted approach" to address the nexus of conflict, food security and climate change, while emphasizing the critical role of political will and global cooperation.





Statement on Haiti by CARICOM Chair, H.E. Dr. Mohamed Irfaan Ali

"As Chairman of CARICOM, I wish to make the following Statement on behalf of the Community in relation to the development in Haiti.

"CARICOM has been singularly focused on the events unfolding in Haiti over the last few days. The expanded Bureau has been meeting separately with Prime Minister Henry, the Stakeholders in Haiti, and our International Partners, to bring resolution to this highly complex matter, where persons' lives and livelihoods are at stake. The complexity requires us in these consultations to ensure that a Haitian-led and a Haitianowned solution may be achieved as soon as possible. We remain deeply engaged and will update on the outcome of our deliberations as soon as practicable. Thank you"

Guyana, Suriname, and Brazil pledge energy cooperation in trilateral declaration

In a joint declaration issued after a trilateral working meeting, Presidents Dr. Mohamed Irfaan Ali of Guyana, Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva of Brazil, and Chandrikapersad Santokhi of Suriname expressed their commitment to strengthen energy cooperation among the three countries. The meeting, held on the sidelines of the 46th Regular Meeting of the Conference of Heads of Government of the Caribbean Community (CARICOM), underscored a shared goal of promoting sustainable development with social justice.

According to the declaration, the Presidents affirmed their commitment to maintaining Latin America and the Caribbean as a Zone of Peace and fostering cooperation for sustainable development. They recognized the historical relations of friendship and good neighborliness binding their nations and highlighted the importance of Amazonian and South American integration.

To advance their common objectives, the leaders agreed to establish trilateral working groups at the technical level, focusing on physical and digital infrastructure, energy, and cooperation in combating transnational illicit activities. The working groups will delve into initiatives of mutual interest and report progress to the respective Ministers for consideration in trilateral ministerial meetings.











Guyana, Suriname, and Brazil pledge energy cooperation in trilateral declaration

In the energy sector, the Presidents pledged to deepen discussions on cooperation in the oil and gas industry, covering exploration, production, regulation, and emergency response plans. They expressed interest in sustainable hydroelectric projects and the integration of electrical networks to enhance regional energy security. The leaders welcomed the opportunity to explore renewable energy modalities, including bioenergy.

Regarding infrastructure, the Presidents acknowledged the potential to strengthen physical and digital connectivity. Projects such as the full paving of the Linden-Lethem road connecting Roraima in Brazil to Georgetown and the modernization of road connections passing through French Guiana were emphasized. Trade and investment facilitation measures along these routes were also deemed crucial.

In the fight against transnational crime, the leaders reaffirmed their commitment to joint police operations, intelligence exchange, capacity development activities, and cooperation projects utilizing remote sensing images. They urged security agencies in Brazil, Suriname, and Guyana to intensify cooperation and build upon initiatives in the Guiana Shield region. The declaration concluded with an emphasis on the successful implementation of the Minamata Convention on Mercury in their respective countries.

ExxonMobil strikes oil offshore Guyana with Stena drillship





U.S.-headquartered energy giant ExxonMobil has made a new oil discovery at the Stabroek block, using a drillship owned by Stena Drilling. This black gold find marks the firm's first hydrocarbon discovery off the coast of Guyana in 2024.

ExxonMobil's latest oil discovery at the Bluefin well, which is located approximately 8.5 kilometers southeast of the <u>Sailfin-1</u> well in the southeastern portion of the Stabroek block, joins the more than 30 already made at this block offshore Guyana since 2015.

Commenting on the new oil discovery, Alistair Routledge, President of ExxonMobil Guyana, highlighted: "Our exploration program continues to improve our understanding of the block's potential to drive viable oil-and-gas development. This latest find reinforces that we have the people, skills and technology to safely and responsibly deliver value to Guyana from the country's resources."

According to the oil major, the Bluefin well encountered around 197 feet (60 meters) of hydrocarbon-bearing sandstone and was drilled by the Stena DrillMAX drillship in 4,244 feet (1,294 meters) of water. This drillship recently became the first one to be awarded DNV's Abate (P) notation, after Stena Drilling implemented an energy management system across its fleet.

ExxonMobil strikes oil offshore Guyana with Stena drillship

ExxonMobil intends to have six FPSOs on the Stabroek block by year-end 2027, with the potential for up to ten FPSOs to develop the estimated gross discovered recoverable resources of more than 11 billion barrels of oil equivalent. The U.S. oil major <u>kicked off</u> <u>production</u> from its third oil development at the block on November 14, 2023.

ExxonMobil Guyana Limited operates the Stabroek block and holds 45% interest while its partners, Hess Guyana Exploration and CNOOC Petroleum Guyana Limited, hold 30% and 25% interest, respectively. Currently, Yellowtail and Uaru, the company's <u>fourth and fifth</u> projects, are in progress and will each produce approximately 250,000 barrels of oil per day. ExxonMobil is working with the government of Guyana to secure regulatory approvals for a <u>sixth project</u> at Whiptail. An FPSO, destined to work on ExxonMobil's fourth oil project in the Stabroek block, <u>left drydock and arrived</u> along the quayside at the Seatrium yard in Singapore last month.






Visit to Nueva Esparta State

H.E. Later, Ambassador met with over 30 Guyanese citizens in the city of Juan Griego, where they shared pleasant moments, clarified doubts regarding Consular matters, listened to concerns and questions from the community. Ambassador expressed his support and constant closeness to the Guyanese diaspora, echoing the message of unity, cooperation, and harmony of His Excellency Dr. Mohamed Irfaan Ali, President of Guyana.

Phagwah (Holi)

Phagwah or Holi as it is commonly called is an annual Hindu Festival of Colours celebrating the arrival of spring. This Festival was brought to Guyana by our East Indian foreparents who first came to Guyana some 186 years ago. This festival has developed into a grand celebration involving Guyanese from all walks of life as they celebrate and enjoy together as One People, One nation and One Destiny.

It is an explosion of colour and unity across the country. Some people started the day at mandirs, where they sang chowtals before colouring each other. In keeping with tradition, Holi is celebrated by the singing of chowtals, special songs that have been handed down from generation to generationas well as spraying of coloured powder and water. Children especially enjoy spraying the coloured water on people passing by with powerful jets known as pichkaris.

Holi is the vibrant and colorful festival of India. Hindu spring festival Phagwah/Holi, also known as the festival of colours, is observed in India, Guyana and many other countries of the World. Holi is split into two events: Holika Dahan and Dhulivandan (Rangwali Holi).

Holika Dahan takes place the night before Dhulivandan, which will be on March 24, this year. Wood and dung cakes are burned in a symbolic lure to signify good defeating evil.

Dhulivandan happens the morning after Holika Dahan, on March 25, 2024 it is a noisy affair where people throw handfuls of colored powder (Gulal) at one another playfully, while getting drenched in water. The timing of Holi is synchronized with the moon, which means that the dates of each celebration vary.

Phagwah (Holi)

Holika Dahan t symbolizes the exuberance of life. It is a day of forgiveness, friendliness, oneness and equality. It is also a celebration of the triumph of good over evil.

As per Hindu scriptures, there was a prince called Prahlad who was an ardent believer of Lord Vishnu. This did not go down well with his father, the powerful and wicked King Hiranyakashyap, because he wanted to be worshipped by everyone. Hiranyakashyap's sister Holika was blessed with a boon of staying unharmed in fire so he asked her to sit on fire with Prahlad in her lap as he wanted his son dead because he was angry with the fact that his son worshipped Lord Vishnu and not him.

While Prahlad was saved from this sinister act as he was a staunch devotee of Lord Vishnu, Holika was burned to flames as a punishment for misusing her power.

This is how the tradition of Holika dahan or Holika bonfire started and it is being practised to mark the beginning of this Hindu festival.

The Guyana Embassy in Caracas, headed by His Excellency, Dr. Richard Van West Charles, extends happy Holi / Phagwah greetings to everyone of Guyanese heritage in Venezuela and everyone at home in Guyana. May this festival of colours continue to enhance peace, love and unity between and among all of us, as Guyanese.

The Holy Month of Ramadan

The 9th and holiest month of the Islamic year, Ramadan is a time when Muslims from all over the world dedicate themselves to working on their spirituality. As part of this month of spiritual rejuvenation, Muslims worldwide fast during daylight hours (consuming no food or water) as a form of worship to bring them closer to Allah (God). Families and friends unite to break their fast together, after sunset during iftar or before dawn during suhour.

During Ramadan, most Muslims try to avoid negative acts or their personal vices, whilst instead practicing positive acts, exercising self-control and showing compassion for those less fortunate than themselves. They aim to better their relationship with God and their community in various ways: by attending the mosque for iftar, spending extra time reading the Quran, participating in volunteer work, or coming together for long nights of prayer.

In Venezuela the first day of fasting was March 11, 2024 and Eid al-Fitz is anticipated to be on April 8 while in Guyana the first day was March 12 and Eid al-Fitz is anticipated to be on April 9. This variance in days is due to the sighting of the Moon. Ramadan ends with the new moon and is celebrated with the holiday of <u>Eid al-Fitr</u>, the Festival of the Breaking of the Fast, where families and friends gather together to share celebratory meals and give gifts to their children. Some gives gift to the less fortunate as well. Eid al-Fitr is considered to be a time for gratitude, forgiveness, and for making amends.
